Salmon are a keystone species, integral to the culture of First Nations in the Lower Fraser, and vital to the regional economy. Flood management respects and restores waterway connections and floodplain habitat so that salmon and other species can thrive.



Advancing Reconciliation

First Nations have inherent authority, title and rights over their territories that have not been respected by colonial governments. Past decisions made First Nations more vulnerable to flood risks. First Nations need to be a part of planning & decision making from the earliest stages and inequities and capacity issues need to be addressed.
